#### **Student Achievement**

# **Teacher Prep Academy**

- In the fall, Cadets traveled to Saginaw Valley State University to attend the LIFT Future Teachers Conference. Five of our Cadets competed in the Read Aloud Competition. We toured campus and met with College of Education faculty and students. Cadets also had the freedom to attend three breakout sessions of their choice.
- This spring, Cadets were invited to participate in Clara Bolen Elementary STEAM (Science Technology Engineering Art and Math) Night. Several Cadets created exhibits which they taught to students and their families.
- Credentials: Two Cadets earned their MiYDA Credential! These are the first two Cadets to achieve this goal in the entire State of Michigan (under its new curriculum). They were required to complete 240 hours OUTSIDE of the school day working with youth. This is a huge undertaking considering our communities do not have agencies such as the YMCA which provide those hours easily to our friends downstate. Congratulations to Katelyn Papenfus and Kylie Sizemore.
- Our Cadets across all four districts have successfully completed 480 hours working within Host Classrooms. Host Teachers absolutely LOVE having Cadets.
- Professional Development: This school year, one full day of Professional Development was held for Cadets each Marking Period. Cadets were trained in CPR, First Aid, AED, and Stop the Bleed. Amy Kennedy presented on Reading Intervention Strategies. Mindy Davis provided

training on Special Education and IEP Meetings. We also did a Google Meet with Lincoln Walczek, a Michigan exchange student who lives in Germany, to learn about that school system.
